# Long Pond Additions

### LAST WEEK'S ARTICLE BROUGHT AT LEAST **ONE SET OF CORRECTIONS**

In the very first issue of Trendy Times my wife Janice wrote a story about Benton's Long Pond. I know I am prejudiced, but I really liked what she had to write.

Well it has come to my attention that she had a couple of things not exactly right. The first and most obvious, once we took the time to really think about it, was that Long Pond is not a New Hampshire State Park. It is in fact part of the White Mountain National Forest. This location has also recently been taken off the list of National Park locations where a fee is charged, or at least requested. Indeed, it is now like National Forest locations like this should be. free for taxpayers to use. I fully understand and agree that a location that is staffed, and has other amenities need to charge a fee to help make ends meet.

Anyhow, back to Long Pond. Apparently there is some question as to what road actually gets you to this gem. Google Maps called it Long Pond Road off Route 116 and then Long Pond Access to the pond itself. Others call Long Pond Road the North and South Road in Benton.

Janice also struck a bit of a chord when referring to Glencliff. A fact that may not be known to everyone is that Glencliff Village used to be part of the town of Benton. It now is a portion of Warren. However, the Glencliff Home, which recently celebrated its 100th birthday, remains in Benton.

The next apparent point of contention refers to the reference to the loons on Long Pond. These are a protected species, though I am thrilled to see them making such a strong comeback on this pond and several other local bodies of water. This is not to say by any means that they are out of the woods. I fully agree that we need to give these great birds plenty of room. But in our defense allow me to say

this. Loons do not seem to mind kayaks or canoes. These birds also don't seem to abide by the rules. It was mentioned that humans are supposed to stay 100 feet away from these birds. However, the birds are quite apt to pop up out of the water well within that distance. And if you are quiet they are more than willing to float there until the next dive takes them to another portion of the pond.

would knowingly interfere with any wildlife on any of these great bodies of water that we so enjoy with our kayaks. I trust this is true with most other paddlers. But I agree that it needs to be mentioned on a regular basis so that we all are aware.

If you have never heard one of these great birds at night calling to their little ones or to their mate, than you have missed a real part of the wildlife of this area. There are several distinctive sounds that the loons make. I am not an expert and therefore will

not even try to further explain. Let it simply be enough to say, if you have never heard them be sure to put it on your Bucket List.

As a final note for this column let me say a big thank you to the person who wrote with these corrections. We certainly will do our best to be sure we offer accurate information in Trendy Times.

However, there is a bit of a creative license involved with some stories that are indeed written for enjoyment of the reading public and not necessarily written as true fact. please accept our apologies for the inaccuracies and again thanks for noticing.



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

# Paddle The Border - Fall

# Some Thoughts From A Paddler

On Sunday, October 4th, there was an event that has become a real part of the great Autumn list of events here in the Connecticut River Valley. The event was Paddle The Border - Fall. It is an excursion on the scenic Connecticut River powered by each individual participant. Canoes and kayaks of all shapes, sizes and styles are paddled by participants of all shapes, sizes and styles. Paddling in this event is great exercise and at the same time very relaxing.

As you can notice while paddling there are those who launch and paddle like they are scared. They want to get where they are going and get

out of the water as soon as possible. Then there are those who paddle in a solid steady manner, being sure to get the job done, get where they are going but not hurry too much.

Next are those paddlers who are in a group. Two or kayaks traveling together. Sometimes a mix of canoes and kayaks. In fact I saw one group of two canoes and one kayak, five people in total, getting the job done. One other group of three kayaks was obviously a group of friends who had not gotten together for a while. They had a great time talking as fast, or faster than they were paddling. It is amazing

how sounds will travel when you are on the water, but like some of the ads say on TV "What happens on the Connecticut, stays on the Connecticut."

There is also the occasional fisherman on this great trip, not necessarily fishing, but at least getting the line wet.

One other difference in the paddlers of this great event is the ability level. Some may think that putting a canoe or kayak on a big river like the Connecticut could be a real challenge. But this section is pretty quiet and will in fact let you coast if you choose. This fall's paddle was preceeded by a night of pretty strong rain. But the river was still relatively quiet and offered virtually no hazards to the participants. This made for just a great day to sit back have an easy paddle and enjoy the foliage, the sights and sounds of a great natural resource, and conversation of those paddling with you or those that were simply passing by.

The bottom line being that whatever your ability level this is a paddle that can be enjoyed by all. Beginners can take a rest when needed. Intermediates can practice strong strokes to get to the next bend or turn around and paddle upstream or just see how fast they can go. And for the more advanced there are always those little tributaries that need to be explored.

At the end of this particular event the flotilla

heads up the Waits River to Landing. Bugbee mentioned earlier there was a good rain the night before and the paddle down the Connecticut was quieter than some times in the past. This meant arriving sooner than normal. I saw at least one group turn around on the Waits and head off to explore some of the marsh lands near the railroad bridge. Now I trust that they all found their way back out and eventually got to the landing.

Once arriving at the landing the event is not over. The bluegrass music by Strawberry Hill Band was wonderful even without power to run the amps. It is a great backdrop and hearing the band playing as you approach the landing site certainly is a unique aspect of this paddle.

Also at the conclusion of the paddle the Rotary Club is standing by with grills fired up with hot dogs and hamburgs plus drinks to satisfy the needs of paddlers. The Rotary is one of those great local organizations that do so much for so many. And they have been there at the end of every paddle ready to serve again.

Thanks for this event also needs to go out to the sponsoring organizations that pull it all together. The Cohase Chamber Commerce, the Newbury Conservation Commission and the Haverhill Recreation prove Commission organizations can get together to create something of value for the area.

It looks like Paddle the

Border has become a part of the fabric of this area. If you have participated before and missed this paddle then you missed a great time. If you have never joined in remember there will be a spring paddle in May 2010 and probably another Fall paddle next October.



# Fire Prevention Week

Friday, October 9th, the North Haverhill Volunteer Fire Department and flying in to visit the Haverhill Middle School fourth and fifth grades.

was scheduled so that the students would experience what the pagers sound like.

The students were also given a bag with several goodies and also a project to

complete and return to their teachers for credit.

One of the highlights of the day was when they were able to go outside and take a hose and run out into the play ground and then re-load the engine. They were also able to walk through the cab of the engine and a few were able to sit in the driver's seat.

The most exciting part of their visit was DART flying in for a landing. The crew gave a brief talk with questions and answers following. The D students all lined up to walk of through the helicopter from one side to the other and again to look at the back where patients are loaded for transport to the hospital.

The North Haverhill Volunteer Fire Department thanks all the teachers and aides for their assistance in helping us through this morning of demonstrations, hands on and learning for the students.
