It was more than 20 years ago when the idea of an organized paddle on the Connecticut River was first suggested. The very first attempt did not happen due to the weather and high water in the river. But a couple of years later Mike Thomas of the Newbury Conservation Commission got together with representatives of the Cohase Chamber of Commerce and the Haverhill Recreation Commission to form the core group that has now organized and sponsored 20 years of Paddle the Border, Spring and Fall.

20th Annual Paddle the Border/Fall

These three groups came together to create this event as another way of showcasing that the Connecticut River may physically divide our communities, but it also unites them. With that in mind the spring paddle starts and ends on the New Hampshire side while the Fall Paddle starts and ends in Vermont. As usual the launch site on Sunday, October 1, 2023 (always the first Sunday in October) will be the Newbury Boat Launch, just off the Haverhill Newbury connector road. It is here that participants are asked to drop off their canoes or kayaks along with paddles, PFD's and other equipment. Volunteers will be present to help with unloading your vehicle as well as keeping an eye on things while at least one of the participants then drives their vehicle to the Memorial Field behind the Bradford Academy building, down to Bugbee landing, and then hop on the bus

that will bring them back to the boat launch. The bus will make at least two runs, the first being about 10 AM and the last about 11 AM.

Past paddles have seen as many as 150 paddlers taking part in this fun and normally very placid paddle down the river. Expect to spend from 3 to 4 hours on the water depending on how often you stop to enjoy the great views, or how many tributaries you try to explore. At the end of the paddle there will be music by the Strawberry Farm Band along with some food and beverages to purchase.

Thanks should also be given out to the Upper Valley Land Trust, Upper Valley Trails Alliance and Bradford Conservation Commission for funding and volunteers. Also thanks to Butler's Bus Service for the transportation.

Paddle the Border - Fall is a fun family event. Please abide by all boating rules and regulations while enjoying a great day with both new and old friends and fellow paddlers. After all it may be the last time you get your boat wet until Paddle the Border - Spring on Sunday, May 19, 2024



Protect Our Wildlife POW

Trappers use a lot of excuses to justify their recreational hobby, but the reality is that trapping not only presents serious animal welfare concerns, it is also a threat to ecosystem health and bio-diversity. to reduce spread of disease in see here: https://drive.google.com/fi le/d/1oSvqZEeSjKcw92n 8hSpa8LHynf9s3O3K/vie w?usp=sharing . Trapping is a recreational hobby enjoyed by about 800 licensed trappers. Back in

The science is clear: predator species like bobcats, fisher, and coyote provide immeasurable benefits to ecosystem health, yet trappers are allowed to trap unlimited numbers of animals during the season. One year, just one trapper killed ten fisher, likely decimating the local population. Just last year, one trapper killed five bobcats and another trapper killed forty four coyotes (that we know of). Unlike other states, including New Hampshire that don't allow the killing of bobcats at all. Vermont has no bag limits on the number of animals a trapper may kill. This presents a threat to local populations, as well as ecosystem health. And it's not just wild animals that are in danger. Last year alone, twelve domestic dogs were *reported* trapped. Unlike recent pro-trapping commentaries, this is not merely anecdotal information.

A seasoned furbearer biologist at the Vermont Fish & Wildlife Department has admitted in Department emails obtained through a public records request that trapping is not needed in Vermont to manage for populations or

Back in the day, trappers pilfered the pelts of our cherished bobcats, otters, and other iconic species and sold them to Russia and China. The North American Model of Wildlife Conservation-that Vermont Fish & Wildlife purportedly adheres to-clearly states that there should be no market in commerce in wildlife, yet their policies allow for it. It's one of the many contradictions held by Fish and Wildlife.

Another excuse used by trappers is that trapping is needed to manage so-called "nuisance" animals, but we often forget why wildlife becomes a problem in the first place. Whether it's unsecured garbage or pet food, chickens allowed to free range, or other factors, it is important that humans take a look inwards to see how we are contributing to the problem. That said, current trapping legislation, bills H.191 and S.111, would still allow for the trapping of animals causing damage to property, as well as dangers to public health and safety. This commonsense piece of legislation would combat the senseless killing of otters, bobcats, beavers, and other wildlife merely for recreation and allow

trapping under certain Massachuconditions. setts and Colorado have similar laws that have been a huge success for wildlife, the public, and our pets. No more leghold and body-crushing kill traps set on public lands haphazardly injuring, maiming and killing both targeted and non-targeting species like dogs, redtailed hawks, owls and endangered species. This legislation would be targeted trapping to address only those animals that are causing problems for humans.

Vermont needs beavers, foxes, and other animals labeled "furbearer" species for the ecosystem services they provide. We are in the throes of climate change and science informs us that beavers help reduce flooding, among many other benefits they offer to humans. Tick borne illnesses are on the rise and according to the Cary Institute, red foxes are the main predator of mice that transmit Lyme to ticks.

The tradition of domination over wildlife, who are merely viewed as lifeless "resources" for the "harvesting," is no longer viable or acceptable to many. No animal should have to chew through their mangled paw to free themselves from a leghold trap to satisfy someone's recreational hobby. When we know better, we must do better.





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You'll find some big differences between traditional and speculative investments and knowing these differences can matter a great deal when you're trying to reach your financial goals.

To begin with, let's look at the basic types of traditional and speculative investments. Traditional investments are those with which you're probably already familiar: stocks, bonds, mutual funds, government securities, certificates of deposit (CDs) and so on. Speculative investments include cryptocurrencies, foreign currencies and precious metals such as gold, silver and copper.

Now, consider these three components of investing and how they differ between traditional and speculative investments:

The first issue to consider is risk. When you own stocks or stock-based mutual funds, the value of your investments will fluctuate. And bond prices will also move up and down, largely in response to changing interest rates. However, owning an array of stocks small-company, large-company, international, etc. - can help reduce the impact of volatility on your stock portfolio. And owning a mix of short- and long-term bonds can help you defend yourself somewhat against in-

terest-rate movements. When interest rates fall, you'll still have your longer-term bonds, which generally - but not always - pay higher rates than short-term ones. And when interest rates rise, you can redeem your monitoring your portfolio and making maturing short-term bonds at potentially higher rates.

Should You Invest ... or Speculate?

With speculative investments, though, price movements can be extreme as well as rapid. During their short history, cryptocurrencies in particular have shown astonishingly fast moves up and down, resulting in huge gains followed by equally huge, or bigger, losses. The risk factor for crypto is exacerbated by its being largely unregulated, unlike with stocks and bonds, whose transactions are overseen by well-established regulatory agencies. There just isn't much that investors can do to modulate the risk presented by crypto and some other speculative investments.

A second key difference between traditional and speculative investments is the time horizon involved. When you invest in stocks and other traditional investments, you ideally should be in it for the long term - it's not a "get rich quick" strategy. But those who purchase speculative investments want, and expect, quick and sizable returns, despite the considerable risk involved.

A third difference between the two types of investments is the activity required by investors. When you're a long-term investor in traditional investments, you may not have to do all that much, once you've built a portfolio that's appropriate for your risk tolerance, goals and time horizon. After that point, it's mostly just a matter of occasional moves - you're not constantly buying and selling, or at least you shouldn't be. But when you speculate in crypto or other instruments, you are constantly watching prices move - and then making your own moves in response. It's an activity that requires considerable attention and effort.

One final thought: Not all speculative instruments are necessarily bad investments. Precious metals, for instance, are found in some traditional mutual funds, sometimes in the form of shares of mining companies. And even crypto may become more of a stable vehicle once additional regulation comes into play. But if you're investing for long-term goals, such as a comfortable retirement - rather than speculating for thrills and quick gains, which may disappear just as quickly you may want to give careful thought to the types of investments you pursue.
