

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






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CONNECTIONS LOST AND FOUND

city.


I don't know how many years fell between the adventure and the letter Rebecca read to us, but I do know that story was the connection.

Fall for St. Johnsbury



All About That ??? Mail

Ma loved the catalogs and sales fliers that filled her mailbox from the end of summer until Christmas. She and Auntie poured over these "wishbooks" with the joy and anticipation of children at the Christmas tree. They delighted in finding the "perfect" gift, so unique and so special for the intended recipient. That was Auntie and Ma.

Me, as I sort through political rhetoric, credit card promotions and sales catalogs, I am not that excited. In fact, I feel overwhelmed by so much mail that I really do not have the time or energy to process. I call it junk mail. However, there is a good reason to be happy to see the excess of the solicitous mailings, it supports the delivery of all mail.

Per the Washington Post, "Today, junk mail is a lifeline for the post office. In 1970, Congress withdrew taxpayer dollars for the agency, passing a law directing it to act like a business by covering its costs. But Congress still required the Postal Service to cover inherently unprofitable parts of running a nationwide system de-

livering to far-flung, often rural parts of the country without taxpayer dollars. Desperate for money, the Postal Service opened the floodgates by granting marketers preferential access to your mailbox at one-third the cost of standard mail." www.washingtonpost.com.

Researching junk mail has made me realize that junk mail is not limited to the mail box on the street. Our E-Mail is full of junk That mail that we sometimes refer to as SPAM. I do know about the online onslaught of unwanted advertisements and inquiries, all looking to get our money, it is everywhere. Online, there is always a place to hit "unsubscribe" and that will get rid of unwanted E-Mails from most of the sellers.

> The stuff that comes in the mail, however, requires more effort. If you go online, depending on your search engine, there are many companies and articles about how to end the junk mail siege. Some of the sites will add to your number of SPAM found in your E-Mail filters. An article that I did find informative with good, useful information came from snappyliving.com,

Forever', "there are two main types of junk mail: direct marketing mail which actually has your name and address, and mail which comes to "resident" at your address. The first kind comes from companies selling mailing lists.

The second kind is usually in the form of circulars, or envelopes full of local coupons, and those companies have no idea who lives at which address – they're sending something to "resident" at every address they can find. Your tactics for stopping these will vary a little."

Tips that include writing "return to sender", calling "800" numbers to complain, and using the return postage paid envelopes sent to you are some of the ideas for ending the junk mail. Stepping back and looking at the junk mail in a different light, it helps keep the rural mail deliveries flowing, people are making a living from the jobs that create it, and for people like Ma and Auntie--sometimes the mail brings joy.

Just a new thought on what may or may not be a daily frustration. Happy Fall.


