


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

Haverhill Select Board Has a Full Plate by Gary Scruton

With the change of seasons, weather-wise, there is also a change in seasons when it comes to top agenda items for the Town of Haverhill Select Board.

Of course there are plenty of ongoing items that keep this group of five residents very busy. As most Haverhill property owners are aware there was a recent reassessment of all property in the town. The assesment was made necessary by the dramatic sometimes changes in selling price of some, and therefore the value of other property in town. This threw off the information that helps to create the tax rate each year. Though some assesments have been appealed, many others appeare to have been set at a much more realistic value.

Also high on the list of to do's is the search for a new Town Administrator. Some 18 applications were received and passed along to a committee of five residents to peruse and choose their top five for the position. It should be noted that before the committee members received the applications, all names, addresses and

other personal information was redacted in order to prevent any type of bias on the part of any member of that committee. The Select Board will then do a much deeper dive on the top candidates before interviews and the eventual hire of a new Haverhill Town Administrator.

Early Autumn also means budget time. It is already time for the department heads in Haverhill to be offering up their proposals for 2025. These requests will then be looked over by the Advisory Budget Committee. That committee is formed by the Town Moderator who would be happy to hear from volunteers. After those deliberations the Select Board will present it to the public before their final approval and then presentation at Town Meeting.

Speaking of Town Meeting there will be three seats up for election this year on the Haverhill Select Board. Those interested in running can not sign up until early next year, but it is never too early to start thinking about it.

Recent developments from the Haverhill Select Board also include a Public Hearing that was set for Monday, September 23 in order to disperse half of the disputed funds for the Woodsville Highway and Fire Departments from a previous town meeting. It has been reported that the Select Board and the Woodsville Precinct Commissioners have agreed to allow for two payments of the money if it passes the public hearing. The first to come very quickly and the second in December after the second billing of property taxes for the year.

Progress is also reported to have happened with the committee to Haverhill study and Woodsville Highway Departments. Fact finding has been completed and it is now time for the parties to sit down and decide just what those facts all mean. and how to move forward from here.

One other note of interest is that two new employees have been hired for the town office in recent weeks. One is a new Tax Collector and the second is a new Finance Officer. Both seem to be taking to their new positons with enthusiasm and the backing of the Select Board.

development, but these properties may take vears to build, if they're built at all. Also, various real estate "seminars" claim they can teach you how to get wealthy by buying and

selling real estate, but these programs are expensive and usually worthless. Gold and other precious metals - Scammers who call themselves "rare coins" merchants may try to sell you gold coins, bullion or other types of precious metals, claiming that these assets will always go up in value (which isn't true) and that "now is the best time to act." You can find legitimate ways to invest in precious metals, possibly through mutual funds, but you'll need to determine whether these assets can be an appropriate part of your investment portfolio.

So, how can you avoid these scams? Here ae some suggestions from the Federal Trade Commis-

Don't be pushed into snap decisions. Scammers will pressure you to act quickly because "space is limited" in an investment offering or a "special deal" won't last long. If someone won't give you time to consider an offer, it's not worth considering.

Be suspicious of "risk-free" claims. All investments carry risk, and no variable investments can claim to provide "guaranteed returns." If an individual or organization downplays the risk of an investment and doesn't want to provide risk disclosures, just walk

Ask about licensing or registration. Legitimate investment professionals must be registered with the Financial Industry Regulatory Authority (FINRA) and be licensed by your

state's securities regulator before they can sell you any investment product. You can check the status of an individual or firm by using FINRA's Broker-Check tool at brokercheck.fina.org.

Do some research. You can search online for the name of the company or individual offering you an investment opportunity. By entering terms such as "review," "scam," "fraud" or "complaint," you may well find that other people have experienced problems or been victimized.

To achieve your financial goals, you'll likely need to invest for decades - so, be wary of scammers who claim to offer a shortcut to success.



And how many divorces would there be every four years if the world actually ran on his track?





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



Rochefort also has stated local law enforcement should enforce immigration laws (an anti-immigrant stance) and schools shouldn't teach the truth about racism & diversity.

Like Rusty Talbot, he's against the Dalton landfill and pro marijuana legalization, which is what many people are paying attention to...but his voting record is conservative & frankly discriminatory. We are in a great district that can elect two State Representatives. Rachael Booth and I are the Democratic candidates. We both believe strongly in public education, and the rights of all our citizens.



Rep Ladd Legislative Report Thank You and Re-alignment of NH's Higher Education

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all who took time from their busy schedules to vote this past Tuesday. Voting is a basic right and an essential civic responsibility. This foundational right affords each of us a say in shaping national, state, and local policies.

Although the legislature does not meet in the summer, intensive work toward making NH's higher education systems more affordable, accessible, and to provide seamless transfer of credits between the two and four year systems has transpired. The two higher education systems are deeply committed to this work. In an environment of fiscal and budgetary challenges for public higher education and the State, resources may not be available to accomplish necessary outcomes immediately, but the ground work for eight major alignment goals has been completed and is well underway.

Action has begun to colocate the Community College System NH (CCSNH) and the University System NH (USNH) system offices in shared working space to foster streamlining and coordination of common adfunctions ministrative reducing duplication and improving efficiency. This will include both studentfacing services as well as alignment of operational areas such as budget and finance, human resources, and facilities management. To accomplish this recommendation, a space assessment was done at NHTI that concluded that the building adjacent to the CCSNH System Office could be repurposed to house the USNH System Office. Farnham Hall provides 9,800 square feet

and will require interior renovation. Total estimated cost of the project, including construction, design, permitting, and contingency is \$3.64M. A joint request from CCSNH and USNH has been made to the Governor's Office for Emergency Relief and Recovery (GOFERR) funds to support this work. Combining system offices at NHTI will eliminate the USNH from paying approximately \$350,000 per year for existing leased space in Concord.

On the curricular side of higher education, the 4 year system is in the process of developing 3-year bachelor degree programs, including online delivery, to raise the level of educational attainment and to make bachelor level degrees more affordable. On August 15, 2024, Plymouth State University (PSU)

submitted a proposal for 96-credit, 3-year bachelor's degrees to the New England accrediting body (NECHE). The first five 3-year undergraduate degree programs PSU is proposing

are: Police Studies, Business Administration, Applied Robotics, Cybersecurity, and Outdoor Adventure Leadership.

These are just 2 of 8 goals identified by the Higher Education Task Force supporting HB1450. As always, I am always happy to discuss any and all of the ongoing efforts to better align the two systems that address our shrinking student demographic and operational cost needs.

Rosemary Beer Bread

Hello hello my fellow chefs! How are you all doing today? I hope you're enjoying this long stretch of beautiful sunny weather, I know I'm loving it. Fall is approaching and cool weather is coming. The leaves and views are changing and incredible. There is beauty everywhere.

So my plantar fasciitis is getting better but not really gone. I can walk but too much walking makes it throb. Also my oven is still broken so I made this recipe in my toaster oven. The loaf pan just fit and it worked out well. As soon as my budget allows me to I will start shopping for a new one. I have to put it on hold because I had to have a 70' dead evergreen cut down. The tree company Totally Trees assessed it and was considered a danger tree. It split in the middle and a windstorm could've blown it down at any point. It was quite a project and very interesting to watch the process take place. So needless to say I'm broke! I'll tell you it's always something, if it's not one thing it's another.

Myself, Polly and our friend Scott went out to try to see the Northern Lights one night. It was actually fun we had many laughs. But no luck on seeing any colors in the northern sky. Many beautiful stars and it was so cool being in total darkness even though. Oh well.

So let's get started with today's recipe and how to make it.

Ingredients

- 3 cups of Bisquick
- 3 Tbsp sugar
- 2 Tbsp dried rosemary
- 2 tsp garlic powder
- 2 tsp thyme
- 1 1/2 tsp garlic salt
- 1/4 tsp cayenne pepper
- 1 12 oz can of light beer
- 2 Tbsp melted butter

Grease a 9x5 loaf pan with butter or Pam, I used Pam spray and it worked well. Preheat oven to 375 degrees. In large bowl combine Bisquick, sugar, rosemary, garlic powder, thyme, garlic salt and cayenne pepper whisk until combined then add 12 oz of beer and mix with the whisk until smooth. Pour into prepared pan and bake for 50 minutes until golden brown.

Cool in pan 5 minutes then carefully remove to a wire rack and brush with melted butter. Let cool for at least 15 minutes before slicing and use a serrated knife to cut. That's it, you are done easy peasy! I ate mine with some softened butter on it and a nice salad. I bought an extra beer and had it together.
