






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












Christa A. Davis July 11, 1961- Oct 22, 2024

Boys & Girls Club of the North Country Awarded \$1.97 million for New Child Care Center

October 22, 2024

October 30, 2024 (Lisbon, NH) -- The Boys & Girls Club of the North Country has been allocated a \$1.97 million grant from the Governor's Office for Emergency Relief and Recovery (GOFERR), led by Commissioner Taylor Caswell. The grant of ARPA funds will be used to create a new child care center at its Lisbon clubhouse.

Lack of access to child care is an urgent concern in the North Country, where the pandemic exacerbated an alreadydwindling supply. The Boys & Girls Club of the North Country gained expertise in the early education field in 2023, when it merged with the Boys & Girls Clubs of Central New Hampshire. The Central NH Club already was operating eight early learning centers in the Greater Concord and Lakes Regions. This summer, the organization opened a child care

October 30, 2024 (Lisbon, NH) -- The Boys & Girls Woods Early Learning Club of the North Country center in Gorham, while has been allocated a retrofitting infant, toddler and preschool classrooms the Governor's Office for Emergency Relief and munity College.

North Country early childhood programs will be overseen by Melanie Smith, Early Childhood Manager for the Boys & Girls Clubs of Central and Northern New Hampshire. Smith has extensive experience in early childhood education as a former center director and licensing and evaluation coordinator for the NH Bureau of Child Care Licensing. She is an adjunct professor at White Mountains Community College. **Executive Director Sandy** Brackett said she was excited that families would have the opportunity for a

"one-stop-shop" for their childcare needs. "We have a great location off of Route 302 and plenty of space. I think families will be happy to have the convenience of dropping off and picking up their preschool and school-age child at the same place. And as the children grow, they can continue with us until they are teenagers, which is really reassuring for kids and families!"

The plan is to construct three early learning classrooms within the Club's current facility next to Evergreen Sports Center. The North Country Club recently received a child care license from the NH Bureau of Child Care Licensing, a major step. Construction is anticipated to begin in Winter 2025.







This Veterans Day, November 11, 2024

This Veterans Day, Americans will remember and reflect upon those who served in active military service while defending life, liberty and our pursuit of happiness. Located in North Haverhill, the VFW Memorial Park displays seven prominent granite stones, including the VFW Post 5245 center piece, surrounded by stones commemorating those who served in World War I, World War II, Korea, Vietnam, Persian Gulf War (Operation Desert Shield and Operation Desert Storm), and the Global War on Terrorism.

During our Nation's history, more than 50 million people have served in our military. But, another group of Americans also deserve our recognition for their bravery and patriotism on this Veterans Day, a day of remembrance. 243,000 Merchant Mariners served our Nation in World War II. Of these courageous mariners, 9,521 perished while serving; a higher proportion of those killed than in any other branch of the US military. These private mariners endured constant submarine attacks and torturous weather to supply crucial supplies, including fuel and ammunition, as well as transporting Allied troops in all theaters of the war, from the Philippines to Europe. General Douglas MacArthur credited mariners with playing a vital role in the liberation of the Philippines. while General Dwight Eisenhower also declared in 1944 that, "when final victory is ours there is no organization that will share its credit more deservedly than the Merchant Marine."

Several years ago, I read an article submitted by a public school Science teacher. He had a saying posted above the door in his classroom. It read, "Life is not determined by what you want. Life is determined by the choices you make." What an important message for all of us, especially for young high school graduates looking to find their way. The North Haverhill VFW Memorial Park is dedicated to those who made the choice to serve our Nation during times of conflict and war. The Park is a fitting and quiet place where we can remember those who served our country and to say thank you.

Economy To the Editor,

The Connecticut Lakes Headwaters Working Forest has been an outstanding success for economic development and conservation over the last two decades. Biomass in the forest has grown every year the agreement has been in place, even in the early years when timber harvest levels were nearly double what they are today. This forest has become a sanctuary for recreation and a model for New Hampshire's leadership in forest conservation. The North Country's economy relies on outdoor recreation and a healthy timber industry, two sectors that have thrived together for decades. However, curtailing timber harvesting to allow California tech giants to claim carbon neutrality threatens this balance.

Local communities voiced strong opposition to Aurora Sustainable Lands, LLC's draft forest management plan at the October 4 Connecticut Lakes Advisory Committee meeting. Aurora's proposal undermines New Hampshire's sustainable forest use, which supports

A Threat to Our Forest local loggers, truckers, and sawmills. Milan the state's Lumber, largest sawmill, has had to cut operations by 20% due to the restricted loa supply from the Connecticut Lakes Headwaters, reducing employee pay and harming the local economy.

> Following that meeting, the Coos County Commissioners Office released a report alerting the state to the seriousness of the situation. In a letter dated October 21, the New Hampshire Association of Counties further urged the state to honor the original intent of the Connecticut Lakes Headwaters easement, emphasizing that Aurora's approach is misaligned with regional needs.

> Aurora must recognize their responsibility not only to the forest but also to the local economy. Protecting our jobs is more important than tech companies' questionable carbon neutrality claims. The state must reject any plan allowing Aurora to further lower harvest levels.

Hello hello my fellow chefs! How are you all doing today? I'm dealing with terrible sciatica pain on my right side. I have sharp and radiating pain in my leg, butt and hip. It's very hard to do much, just getting up and down is a struggle. I brought a chair in the kitchen to make these cookies having to sit in between steps. I'm managing as best as I can. It's been 10 days since this started and I've never had this before so I'm not sure when it will end so fingers crossed that it's soon. I remember my dad saying how it's tough to get old, now I understand.

Well let's get started with today's recipe and how to make it. I got 24 cookies using a cookie scoop that is 1 1/2 Tbsp size. It's a good tool to have, the cookies mon mix well. Preheat oven Cin Pin come all the same size and they are inexpensive. I found that these cookies spread out a lot. The first batch I placed 4 across and they ran into one another so I tried placing only 3 across and it was fine so put only 3 across. I used my air fryer on bake to make them. Using a regular cookie sheet in your oven put 12 per sheet and you should be fine.

Check at 8 minutes because I let mine go 10 minutes and they got overcooked. It depends on your oven and the thickness of the sheet pan. Cool in pan 1 minute then transfer to wire racks to finish cooling. That's it you are done! They are very tasty "Delicioso" and yes they are easy peasy! I'm still getting used to using the air fryer for baking and the crisscross pattern on mine disappeared and I'm not sure why. Either way they are good.
