She attended St. Leo Catholic School and later Canby High School, where she graduated with academic honors and as homecoming queen in 1956. She married Clayton Bertamus on June 18, 1957. ends to put up bushel after bushel of cucumbers, beans, corn, peaches, and tomatoes.

Wherever Rosy went, people instantly felt her warm and generous spirit. In her many moves, from St. Leo to Canby to St. Cloud to Farmington to Vermont, she was quick to make friends and become a beloved part of the community. Whether she organized holiday bazaars to support the local hospital, hosted bridal and baby showers and birthday parties for relatives and friends, or simply put the coffee on early in the morning, Rosy would find what needed to be done and she did it. She was creative, funny, energetic, and generous with her time and love. Athletic in a time before women in sports was the norm, she settled for cheering on her favorite teams, especially the ones on which her children, grandchildren, and nieces and nephews played.

Rosy thrived outside in nature and fresh air and was drawn to birds, butterflies, flowers, and all things green and growing. Over the past 10 years she visited numerous national parks out west, with her favorite being the Grand Canyon. In 2019, Rosy moved to Vermont to live with her daughter Laurie and Laurie's husband, Rowe. There she further developed her keen interest in bird watching and tree, fern, and flower identification while also maintaining her lifelong commitment to community and community events by volunteering for summer festival and turkey supper tasks. No one can peel a potato like Rosy, a result of nearly 80 years of cooking and baking with love and purpose. No one will forget her BBQ ribs, marshmallow brownies, creamy cu-

cumbers, or potato salad. In her later years, she continued to help with the family tradition of canning and freezing corn and peaches every fall.

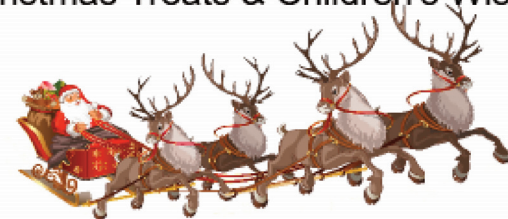

Rep Ladd Legislative Report

Regulation and Road Access to Development

Traditionally, election day in Haverhill is usually cold and blustery, but we lucked out this past week. November 5, 2024 was a very pleasant opposite, and I want to thank all that stood and waited in the voting line. It's a time when many stop and say hi to friends.

Voters in New Hampshire sent a clear message, "keep taxes low, keep the economy growing, and keep government constrained." According to The Josiah Bartlett Center for Public Policy, the legislature will most likely place an emphasis on deregulation in an effort to encourage development. According to the Bartlett Center, "Massive price increases caused by a severe shortage of housing is by far the state's #1 concern for Granite Staters. The shortage is caused primarily by regulations that make it harder and more expensive to build new housing. Expect an emphasis next year on relaxing state regulations (such as burdensome environmental permitting rules) as well as a reexamination of local regu-

latory authority over private property rights for both residential and commercial property."

During the past month, I have been asked to write and introduce a bill easing up on the minimum state road access requirements that have slowed down the development of affordable and abundant housing in the southwestern area of New Hampshire. Policymakers in both the state and at the local municipality levels acknowledge the need to increase housing availability and affordability. Private investors, contractors, and property owners are anxious to address the housing issue, but they often slowed down or rejected when dealing with local boards enforcing local policy or state law.

The filing period for new legislation began on November 6, and several days later, I introduced legislation providing flexibility in enabling private roads to provide access to a lot upon which a building is proposed to be placed. Currently, there is statutory language that

provides private roads to provide access, but the statute, with a number of regulatory requirements, is time consuming and costly. Proposed language in my proposed legislation states: "(1) The municipality neither assumes responsibility for maintenance of said roads nor liability for any damages resulting from the use thereof, and (2) Prior to the issuance of a building permit, the applicant shall produce evidence that notice of the limits of the municipality responsibility and liability has been recorded in the county registry of deeds for the lot for which the building permit is sought." This language has the potential of expediting planning board approval of private road access and protects municipalities from responsibility and liability.

Once again, I thank the residents for supporting my re-election this past week. Respectfully Submitted, Rep Rick Ladd

Pumpkin Chocolate Chip Muffins

Hello hello my fellow chefs! How are you all doing today? I'm doing okay. My sciatica pain is 80% better so that makes life a lot easier. I had to have my teeth cleaned last week. 2 of my teeth are starting to bother me and after X-rays they told me that I have a lot of bone loss and those 2 teeth are beginning to wiggle. I can't believe it, I can chew some foods but crunchy and meats are getting hard. Even brushing my teeth I have to be so careful. They said as you age bone loss is common but lately with one problem or another I truly feel like I am falling apart! But I'm happy to report that all my furry babies are healthy and happy so that's a good thing. This week I searched for a recipe that used pumpkin and I found this one. After reading all the comments of people that made it I had to adjust spices and the oven temperature. The original recipe said to bake at 400 degrees but that's way too hot for baked goods. I made 2 trays of 6 trying first reducing the oven temperature to 375 degrees. The first batch I greased and floured the muffin pan and baked for 18 minutes and when I checked them they were getting overdone and too brown. I had put a few

chocolate chips on top and they were starting to burn so I don't recommend doing that. The second batch I used paper muffin cups and turned down the temperature to 350 degrees and baked for 18 minutes then checked with a toothpick inserted into center and they were done. I used my toaster oven to bake them and it may cook quicker than a regular oven so check them at 18 minutes. Well let's get started with the recipe and how to make them.

Ingredients
 3/4 cup packed brown sugar
 1/4 cup vegetable oil
 2 large eggs at room temperature
 1 tsp vanilla extract
 3/4 cup canned pumpkin
 1/4 cup milk
 1 1/2 cups all purpose flour
 3/4 tsp baking powder
 1/2 baking soda
 1 Tbsp ground cinnamon
 1/2 tsp ground allspice
 1/2 tsp pumpkin pie spice
 1/2 tsp salt
 1/2 cup chocolate chips

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease well and flour muffin pan or use paper muffin liners. In medium bowl whisk brown sugar, oil, eggs and vanilla extract until well combined and break apart any sugar

lumps. Add in pumpkin and milk and mix until well blended. In separate medium bowl mix flour, baking powder, baking soda, cinnamon, allspice, pumpkin spice and salt with another whisk until combined. Add flour mixture to pumpkin mixture mixing just enough to combine. Do not over mix. Gently fold in chocolate chips. Fill muffin cups 2/3 full with batter. Bake in preheated oven for 18-22 minutes checking center with toothpick until it comes out clean. This recipe makes 12 muffins. That's it, you are done. Store in a covered container. They are easy peasy to make and very tasty, you know "Delicioso"! Please give this recipe a try because your family will love them and call you a star so enjoy. Well folks that's it for today's recipe. They are a nice change for using pumpkin and would be great for Thanksgiving. Have a wonderful Thanksgiving my friends. Stay safe and healthy everyone.
