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At different times, inflation may be high or low, but, except in those rare periods of deflation, it's always with us. During your working years, when you may receive boosts in your salary, you at least have the potential to keep up with inflation - but what happens when you retire? Consider inflation-adjusted bonds. You might want to consider Treasury Inflation-Protected Securities (TIPS), which are indexed to the Consumer Price Index, so the principal increases with infla-

tion (and decreases with deflation). Another inflation-adjusted Treasury security is the I bond, which differs from TIPS in that the principal doesn't change but the interest rate does, every six months, based on a combination of a fixed interest rate and the inflation rate. Like all investments, though, TIPS and I bonds have various features and risks of which you should be aware before invest-

Delay taking Social Security. You can start collecting Social Security benefits at 62, but your monthly checks will be much bigger if you wait until your full retirement age, likely between 66 and 67. You would receive the maximum amount if you waited until 70 before collecting. Of course, if you need the money to help support your retirement, you may not be able to afford to wait, but if you can, your bigger checks can be a big help against inflation.

Think about extending your employment. If you like what you do, you might want to consider working a few years longer than you had originally intended. Not only will you be bringing in more income, but you could also continue to contribute to retirement accounts, including your IRA and 401(k). Even if you don't want to continue working full time, you could do some part-time work or consulting. Any earned income you bring in can help in your fight against inflation.

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



I was pondering Daniel Goleman's book "Emotional Intelligence" last night, partly because it had come up in conversation with friends a couple of days ago, but also because of the actions taken by another friend in the wake of the recent Presidential election.

She is so traumatized by the election results, she sent emails to everybody in her address book letting us know she is putting herself into self-imposed hibernation mode no emails, no calls, no contact with anybody until she decides what she's going to do about this sad state of affairs.

To each his own I guess.

Personally, I don't know how much change she hopes to illicit shut down and barricaded against the world.

And I'm not sure leaving all her perceived villains to their own devices is the best way to keep them in check.

It is possible she will be paralyzed until she's able to reconcile, what Goleman described as our two minds, the thinking one and the feeling one, in order to establish some middle ground for herself.



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
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Picture it Sicily 1922..... By Stevie Sassparilla

Just kidding it was May something or other 2024 and I woke up on a sticky jailhouse cot. I was definitely still drunk. Those 6 Gin and Tonics probably were a poor choice. But hey when you are Manic and stuck in that high you really do not have the true cognitive ability to make the best decisions.

Over the previous 6-8 months or so leading up to this god-awful morning I had made some outrageously terrible decisions. What I had not known until about December of 2023 was that I was Bipolar.

Bipolar disorder type 2 is such a funny disorder. You feel like you are on top of the world one moment and then the next kills me. you would love nothing more than to get taken out by a speeding train to end it all. I have unknowingly battled these emotions my whole 38 years of life. I just thought I was a spirited red-headed spitfire. I did not know that my fluctuating moods and rebellious attitude were

part of a roller coaster ride of a disorder.

Silly Me.

So anyways... I woke up still super drunk and rather confused as to where I was and what the hell I had done. I was in jailhouse attire and covered in bruises. As I sobered up and

pieces of the previous evening started to come back to me. I was so ashamed of the behavior that led up to my recent stint in the drunk tank. However, to this day I do not remember all the details, and some have been given to me by those that were there. In my manic psychosis which is defined as "Manic psychosis is a severe form of mania that involves a break from reality and can include delusions and hallucinations." I threw rocks

> receive enough training in mental health matters.

The aftermath of this evening will probably haunt me for the rest of my days. I wish I could take back the part that traumatized my 16-yearold. For me, this is the worst part of the whole event. I can never

undo that damage, and it kills me.

I was promptly slapped with a protection order and could not see my children until court two weeks later. Mind you I have been their adoring momma their entire lives. This effectively broke me. A few years ago, I was a Pinterest-perfect stay-athome mother. I made cookies, decorated

for every occasion, and threw some amazing birthday parties. I was navigating the world of

being a special needs mom and a sports mom with a high schooler. Not everything was perfect though. I have always

been a bit moody and rebellious. I get

overwhelmed and say terrible things out of my anxiety. I struggled with postpartum depression and suicidal thoughts and feelings my entire life. I never realized my struggles stemmed from a mental health disorder.

lar disorder impulse conpretty trol is much nonexistent. You obsess and you live for that feeling of being "high on the hog" You feel so grand that you do not want it to go away. This is why so many people with Bipolar have substance abuse problems. I never had a "drinking problem" not in the sense that I needed to drink every day. When I start drinking my "party gremlin" comes out and I cannot stop. I act

like a fool, I flirt, I fight, and I cannot

stop until I pass out.

I usually would abstain from alcohol. It often gave me a headache so I usually do not drink but I was so out of my mind manic that I was drinking almost daily to excess.

Party Goblin is the term I would use for manic me. I would just drink and be "obnoxious"

Which unfortunately was the term my partner at the time had used to describe me. When

you have Bipolar you are your own worst critic anyway so any criticism cuts like a knife its super painful. I hated that

he perceived me at being obnoxious. I thought I was just having fun.

My family ended up dropping the protection order providing that they saw a real effort by me to curb my drinking and acting out. I did this dutifully but my relationship with my oldest son was damaged—the events of that night and the few months before took a toll on him.

We continue to work on our relationship daily, it's sometimes a struggle but in the end, I

know he knows his mother adores him and would jump in front of a speeding train for him and his brother.

I am diligently working on myself. I am learning who I am and what this diagnosis means for

me. It's sometimes comforting to know that the extreme feelings I have felt my entire life

are more a part of the disorder rather than me being a terrible person. I religiously take my

meds and attend therapy. I read, research, and try everything I can to ensure I am rebuilding

the best me possible for myself and my young men.

This road will not be easy but very much necessary to make sure that I am still here and present for them.

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

NH Public School Infrastructure Annual Report

Sununu charged the School Safety Preparedness Task Force to find agreed upon recommendations on making New Hampshire's schools safe. The task force spent more than 1,000 hours researching and discussing the most pressing issues involving school safety and security, including conducting a comprehensive review of state, local, federal, and private research while seeking and evaluating public comment and suggestions. Visits were made to schools to meet with school administrators, staff, students, local emergency responders and parents. Local fire, police, and first responders from around the state worked with the task force members in developing action recommendations contained in the final report. The 2018 task force report contains 59 recommendations addressing: legislative action, mental health, planning, training, school emergency operation plan exercises, communication, and facility upgrades.

Upon receiving the report, the Public School Infrastructure Fund and Public School Infrastructure Commission was established

Five years ago, Governor (RSA198:15-y and z). The includes commission members from the Senate and House, the Director of Homeland Security, the Chairman of the State Board of Education, the Chairman of the School Building Authority, and the Commissioner of the Department of Education. Since 2018, the commission has allocated \$52.6M toward upgrading school safety and security measures and protocols. This total allocation has been sourced by State Public School Infrastructure Funds (\$42.6M) and Federal ARPA Funds (\$10M).

> The Round 3 funding application process, the Security Action for Education (SAFE) grants program, opened on October 30, 2023 and the last day to request reimbursement closes on January 30, 2025. The Pub-School Infrastructure lic Commission is tasked with recommending and advising the governor on proposals for expenditures from the public school infrastructure fund. The Commission has directed grants toward supporting school security: surveillance, access control, and emergency alerting/ communications.

When asking parents to describe K-12 education, the following is communicated, "Schools must be safe and secure, schools must provide competent teachers, and my child's high school graduation diploma must be meaningful."

The Public School Infrastructure Commission in coordination with the Department of Education and New Hampshire Homeland Security has worked tirelessly to better ensure school safety preparedness. As Governor Christopher T. Sununu mentioned in his February 15, 2018 State of the State Address, "If we can't put our kids on a school bus and truly believe that they're going to be safe, then nothing else matters." The PSI Commission met this past month and recommended that the upcoming NH Biennium Budget include \$10M to further support needed safety and security upgrades for waitlisted NH schools.
